## Valuable information

The event highlighted the need to create

the threats that exist online, responsible online behavior and how to ensure one's safety online. The event was attended in large numbers with the first round conducted in Thane sensitising 25,000 students and 5,000 parents. Useful information on how students can secure their social media identity and make use of technology safely was also shared. "There are a lot of people in the world who have access, knowledge and skills as hackers and can pose a huge threat to children. Parents, principals and teachers together need to explain this to the students," shared Katkar.

Psychiatrist Dr. Harish Shetty, who was also part of the panel at this event, highlighted how long hours on the internet and cyber bullying affect young minds mentally. He shared, "I have had cases of young patients suffering from depression and aloofness as they are so hooked onto the social media-addiction to gaming is also quite high. This is majorly because parents are not talking to the kids about cyber threats and the need to stay online for a healthy amount of time.'
