According to the police, their team was on regular patrol. Meanwhile, constable Yogesh Mandhare got a tip-off about Arora. Acting on the tip-off, Assistant Inspector Nitin Kumar Nayak and his team from the Anti-Narcotics Cell laid a trap in the Bharati Vidyapeeth area and arrested him. The police said they recovered 2.14 kg of charas, 1.79 kg of ganja, and other valuables worth ₹43.87 lakh from Arora.

Regarding the matter, a case has been registered at the Bharati Vidyapeeth Police Station under the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act.

Students and residents have to travel in jam-packed city buses with no space to even breathe, commuters allege. Rupesh Sarode, a resident of Kothrud, mostly takes bus no 99 (Kothrud-Vishrantwadi) on weekends. Speaking about the harrowing experience, Sarode told The Free Press Journal (FPJ) that he believes fewer buses plying on the route is the cause of overcrowding. "Due to a lot of stoppages, commuters experience jerking due to the brake being applied. More buses should be deployed, especially for long routes," Sarode said.

Expressing his frustration with overcrowding and ticketing issues, Chaitanya Ket, a Kothrud resident, said, "Commuting by bus has become nearly impossible. Today, I took a bus from Hinjawadi to PMC, and it was overcrowded." Highlighting the ticketing issue, Ket told the FPJ, "Passengers were



requesting online payment options, but the process was time-consuming for the visibly frustrated conductor. Most passengers were handing him ₹100, ₹200 or ₹500 notes, but what choice do they have when online payments have become the norm and cash circulation is minimal?"

"The bus was packed, with passengers crammed together. At each stop, people rushed to board the bus, some even hanging outside. It's especially challenging for women to get in and out of the buses, but it felt like navigating an obstacle course in a Takeshi's Castle game," he added. "The bus itself was in

poor condition, rattling with noise and jerking, as if it could break down at any moment. As I looked out at the roads lined with flex banners, the smiling faces of visionary leaders stared back at us. They were smiling at us." Ket further added. Another resident, Shubham Khirsagar, pointed out, "Overcrowding has been the second name or synonym of public transport in our country for a long time. Two years ago, Delhi HC expressed concern about this and sought a report from the Union Government, but the situation remains the same." PMPML officials acknowledge the issue and they

expect the induction of new buses by the end of the month will help increase frequency to curb overcrowding. TEENAGER CRASHES CAR INTO SHOP

Maha Cyber Dept prevents two suicides

The Maharashtra Cyber Department, the state's nodal agency for cybercrime and security, recently intervened in two alarming incidents involving cyber harassment and blackmail through loan applications in the Pune district. In both cases, swift action by cyber analysts and

local police saved the victims from attempting suicide.

In the first case, a 22-year-old man from Pune borrowed ₹2,800 through a loan app and repaid it, yet continued to face extortion calls demanding more money. When he refused, the perpetrators shared explicit, morphed photos of a female relative with his family via WhatsApp. The traumatised victim called

the Maharashtra Cyber Helpline 14407, expressing suicidal thoughts. Cyber analysts immediately contacted the local police station, leading to prompt action that ensured his safety.

In a separate incident, a 35-year-old man borrowed ₹5,060 for medical expenses. Despite agreeing to a monthly EMI of ₹1,700, the loan app doubled the repay-

ment demand. Upon his refusal, the fraudsters threatened to circulate explicit photos. The victim contacted the helpline, sharing his distress and suicidal intentions. Cyber analysts flagged the case as "severe blackmailing" and alerted both the police station and control room, resulting in immediate intervention and protection for the victim.
